It's been another successful Washington legislative session for NEBC and the environmental industry. Kudos to Jerry Smedes and his associates. We went into the session with the focus of defending our past successes (tax incentives and the Permit Assistance Center outsourcing program.) We emerged with tax incentives in place and an expanded outsourcing program, now to encompass other agencies. Retention of the tax incentives provides direct value to the bottom line of every firm doing environmental work in the state. The expanded outsourcing program (see below for more details) will also bring contractual opportunities to a broad spectrum of firms in the state and region.

Here's the challenge. Each year NEBC members invest in a lobbyist and government affairs effort that has consistently paid dividends for the whole industry. Yet, when non-member firms are approached about joining and supporting the industry's association, they respond, "Thanks, keep up the good work! But look somewhere else for the financial support!" - GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS -

NEBC PRIORITY LEGISLATION PASSES

NEBC went into the 2002 Legislative Session in Washington with a primary emphasis on protecting advantages we had secured for environmental companies in prior years. Not only were we able to defend those advantages, but we were successful in broadening an important contracting opportunity for NEBC members.

The Permit Assistance Center (PAC) has operated for several years in the Department of Ecology to provide permit information to citizens and businesses in the state. In fact, 20 percent of the 1,228 requests for information in 2001 were from environmental and engineering consultants. The PAC is also the focal point for managing contracts for permit assistance provided by NEBC members and other companies under a cost-reimbursement program. This program was established two years ago through a legislation that NEBC played a key role in passing. This program allows permit applicants to enter into agreements with the permitting agencies and hire outside technical consultants to provide additional technical resources to expedite review of their permits.

Some members of the business community had threatened to advance legislation to abolish the cost reimbursement program, thereby eliminating an important contracting opportunity for environmental companies. NEBC worked closely with the Department of Ecology, business and environmental groups to protect and expand this important program. We were deeply involved in negotiating a bill to maintain the PAC, and to make the cost reimbursement program available to all permit applicants.

Governor Gary Locke recently signed legislation that will move the PAC to the Governor's office, and greatly increase the availability of the cost reimbursement program for permit applicants. The current program is only available for water rights permits and complex permits that require an EIS. Under the new law, *any* applicant for an environmental permit can enter into an agreement to pay for additional outside resources and expertise in the permit review. This is a major victory for the environmental industry.

Our second priority this year was to protect tax benefits that NEBC has fought hard to gain for environmental companies over the past several years. NEBC was primarily responsible for passing tax incentives for environmental remediation and for research and development in environmental technologies in recent years. These tax incentives have saved millions of dollars in state business and occupation taxes for Washington. With the current budget crisis, these and other tax benefits for businesses were under severe pressure this year.

The tax incentives that benefit our member companies are important for economic development as well as for protecting the environmental health of our state. During the legislative session, there were repeated attempts to put these tax benefits "on the table" for consideration in resolving the budget deficit. NEBC coordinated with other affected industries, and helped to keep these tax benefits intact. One ominous development was the passage of a bill that reduces to a simple majority the vote needed to pass new tax measures (or to eliminate existing tax advantages). There is a very clear message that revenue "enhancements" are a real possibility in 2003. These could take the form of increased business and occupation taxes, repeal of tax incentives, or imposition of new taxes on businesses. NEBC will be monitoring these developments during the interim, and be prepared to protect our industry in 2002.

COURSES IN GROUNDWATER MODELING AND FUNDAMENTALS OF SOIL AND GROUNDWATER CONTAMINATION

APPLIED GROUND WATER MODELING -Hands On Training with MODFLOW, WINTRAN, and MT3D (GHYD-406) will be held April 9 - 11, 2002, 8:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. (3 Days) at the Technology Access Foundation, Main Computer Lab, 801 - 23rd Avenue S., Seattle, Washington. This course focuses on the application of MODFLOW and associated complementary software to the solution of ground water problems. The course is strictly applied. Each participant will have their own computer workstation for hands on exercises. The specific mathematics used by the models will not be discussed in detail. The instructor will focus on geochemical and hydrological concepts and modeling methods for solving ground water flow and transport problems. The course will include lecture and hands-on computer exercises. On the third day, attendees will set up and work on example projects.

FUNDAMENTALS OF SOIL AND GROUNDWATER CONTAMINATION (GHYD-403) will be held June 11 – 13, 2002 at 8:30 AM to 4:00 PM at the OXARC Training Center located at 4003 E. Broadway, Spokane, Washington. This course provides participants with an improved understanding of the fundamental processes governing transport and fate of contaminants in the subsurface. Participants will learn the chemical, hydrogeologic, and biological factors affecting the migration of contaminants in soil and groundwater and general methods for modeling these factors. The instructors will provide practical information on methods used to estimate and model necessary parameters for transport and fate investigations. This course will include hands on exercises that will help participants apply course concepts to real world scenarios.

ENVIRONMENTAL TECHNOLOGY VERIFICATION PROGRAM

Here are a few highlights of the EPA ETV Program for the past month. NEBC continues its work with ETV and we welcome updates from members on your interaction with the program. If you would like to explore the application of ETV technologies, please contact NEBC staff. We are especially interested in vendors seeking to submit a technology for verification or consultants applying a verified technology in the market. The ETV Program has verified more than 160 technologies to date. The latest is the following:

DUST SUPPRESSION AND SOIL STABILIZATION TECHNOLOGIES TO BE TESTED, VENDORS INVITED

The ETV Air Pollution Control Technology (APCT) Verification Center, run by the Research Triangle Institute (RTI), is planning two tests to verify the performance of dust suppression and soil stabilization products. The year long tests will be conducted at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, and Maricopa County, Arizona, from May 2002-2003. Vendor meetings are being held on March 20, 2002, at Maricopa County and April 3, 2002, at Fort Leonard Wood. Vendors interested in participating are requested to notify RTI and to specify the test sites they choose. MULTI-PARAMETER WATER PROBES TO BE TESTED, VENDORS INVITED

The ETV Advanced Monitoring Systems Center is inviting vendors to submit technologies and participate in a verification test to be conducted in April 2002 in the Charleston, SC, area. The verification test will include some or all of the following parameters: temperature, pH, nitrate, phosphate, turbidity, conductivity, chlorophyll, and dissolved oxygen. The AMS Center is collaborating on the test with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Center for Coastal Environmental Health and Biomolecular Research (CCEHBR) in Charleston, which offers freshwater, salt water, and a controlled site for testing. THREE VENDORS COMPLETE TESTING FOR DECENTRALIZED (ON-SITE) WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEMS FOR RESIDENTIAL NUTRIENT REDUCTION, OTHER TESTING UNDERWAY

Four vendors are participating in the ETV Source Water Protection Technology Pilot's verification testing with residential nutrient reduction technologies at the field test location on Cape Cod, MA. Three of these vendors: F.R. Mahony & Associates, Waterloo Systems, Inc., and AWT Environmental completed their test cycle in March 2002. The third vendor, Septitech, Inc., started testing late last year and will complete the required 12-month schedule later this year. A fifth vendor, Bio-Microbics, Inc., has a technology installed at an alternate test facility located in Vancouver, B.C., and is currently in the early months of testing. HARBOR ISLAND SUPERFUND SITE CLEANUP

Major activities on the island have included: shipbuilding, port and rail shipping, petroleum product storage and transfer, secondary lead smelting, lead fabrication and metal plating. In 1983, the 400-acre Harbor Island and its adjacent marine sediments were placed on the National Priorities List as a Superfund site.
