NEBC WORKING WITH WASHINGTON OFFICIALS ON CONTRACTING OPPORTUNITIES

The legislators have gone home from Olympia, and the process of implementing the laws passed in the 2002 Legislative Session in Washington is now underway. One of our principal legislative issues this year was maintaining and expanding the opportunities for permit applicants to contract with regulatory agencies to hire outside technical support for the permit review. House Bill 2308 was signed by Governor Locke on April 2. This bill significantly expands the existing cost-reimbursement program created two years ago under a legislative program supported by NEBC.

The new law transfers the Permit Assistance Center (PAC) from the Department of Ecology to the Office of the Governor. The PAC is also empowered to enter into cost-reimbursement agreements with any applicant for environmental permits. These agreements will allow the state to secure outside contractors to assist in reviewing permit documents. Under the earlier program, several NEBC members have been hired to provide technical support for Ecology, and expedite permit reviews. That program was limited to water rights and projects that require an EIS. The new program does not include those limitations.

NEBC is working with state officials to help assure a smooth transition from the operation of the PAC in Ecology to the Governor's Office. We will also identify the contracting process, and assure that NEBC members have early notice of opportunities to submit proposals and qualifications for the consultant pool for this program.

LICENSING FOR GEOLOGISTS IN WASHINGTON

Effective July 1, 2002, professional geologists working in Washington are required to have a license from the state. Only licensed geologists, geological specialists, qualified professional engineers, or someone under their supervision may prepare reports that provide geological services. Prior to that date, there is an opportunity to apply for a Washington State Geologist License without taking the national Association of State Boards of Geology exam or the state-specific engineering geologist and hydrogeologist specialty exams.

To qualify for the license without taking the examinations, applicants must have at least five years of experience in geology or geologist specialty field, and a bachelor of science degree in geology, engineering geology, hydrogeology, or one of the related geological sciences or equivalent coursework.

Details of the requirements, and procedures to apply for a geologist license, are provided in the Washington State Department of Licensing's website, www.wa.gov/dol/geofront.htm.

DEQ 2003 LEGISLATIVE CONCEPTS

DEQ is discussing ideas for legislation with interested and affected parties. DEQ's goal is to work with interested and affected parties to reach agreement before the 2003 Legislative Session. Below is a list of concepts proposed.

Help Finance Landowner Projects to Protect Salmon and Water Quality – LC 34000-01

The Oregon Plan for Salmon and Watersheds calls on DEQ to revise the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) to enable more nonpoint source pollution control projects to be eligible for funding. The CWSRF currently provides direct loans to public entities for sewage treatment and stormwater control improvements as well as nonpoint pollution projects. This concept will create a mechanism for providing low-interest loans to private landowners for non-point source pollution control projects. *The concept supports DEQ's Strategic Direction to Protect Oregon's Water.* Contacts: Karen Tarnow, 503.229.5988, and Mike Llewelyn, 503.229.5324.

Placeholder for Hazardous Waste Work and Fee Modifications – LC 34000-03

The 2003-2005 revenue supporting DEQ's hazardous waste work is projected to be substantially less than what is needed to maintain existing services. Revenues may be from \$1.5 to \$3 million short. The Director has appointed a work group of key stakeholders to discuss what hazardous waste work the Department must or should continue to do, and how to pay for that work. The work group has met once, is engaged, and will shape its recommendations over the next few months. From there, a budget package and a legislative concept, if needed, can be finalized. *This concept supports DEQ's Strategic Direction to Protect Human Health and the Environment from Toxics.* Contact: Bob Danko, 503.229.6266.

Cleanup of Abandoned and Inactive Mines – LC 34000-04

This concept would improve Oregon's ability to clean up contamination from abandoned and inactive mine sites that are a high risk to people's health or the environment. The concept provides flexibility in the use of funds in the Orphan Site Account, to allow more efficient and effective use of available funds, and encourage cooperative approaches to cleaning up pollution from abandoned mines. *This concept supports DEQ's Strategic Direction to Protect Oregon's Water and Protect Human Health and the Environment from Toxics.* Contact: Bob Danko, 503.229.6266.

Clean Air Councils – LC 34000-5

This concept would authorize the Environmental Quality Commission to establish local Clean Air Councils at the request of local government or stakeholders. A council would be dedicated to seeking fund (from foundations, federal grants and other sources) for local work such as technical studies and incentive programs to address local clean air needs. Council membership would be balanced to include large and small businesses, citizens, environmental groups, and local governments. *This concept supports DEQ's Strategic Directions to Protect Human Health and the Environment from Toxics and Involve Oregonians in Solving Environmental Problems.* Contacts: Greg Aldrich, 503.229.5687, and Andy Ginsburg, 503.229.5397.

The timeline to take these concepts to session is as follows:

- June 30: Agency Request budget submitted to DAS for audit
- Sept 1: DEQ Agency Request budget submitted to DAS
- Nov/Dec: Governor announces decision on agency budget requests; agencies can appeal to Governor; Governor submits Governor's Recommended Budget
- Dec 15: Deadline for Governor to file agency legislative concepts that have been approved by DAS and Governor
- Jan 2003: Legislative Session begins
- Jan/Feb 2003: New Governor can submit new or revised Governor's Recommended Budget

CALL FOR BROWNFIELD PROJECTS!

On April 17, 2002, Doug Mac Court of Ater Wynne LLP and Kim Marcus of URS Corp. gave a presentation at a Cascade Chapter Luncheon regarding the recently passed Small Business Liability Relief and Brownfields Revitalization Act - HR 2869. The presentation reviewed the components of the act and focused on the implications for brownfield funding. The act authorized the appropriation of \$200 million for brownfield funding per year for five (5) years beginning in the fourth quarter of 2002. In addition to the funding request, the act also eliminated the previous total petroleum hydrocarbon (TPH) restriction for brownfield projects.

The Senate passed the Brownfield Site Redevelopment Act in late April authorizing \$60 million per year for the program from 2002 through 2006. Currently, the EPA is establishing grant and loan application criteria.

What are the ramifications of this funding for NEBC members? If your client has a potential brownfield project that may be ideal for funding, now is the time to put the pieces together for a grant proposal for submittal once the application criteria is defined. These pieces should include, but not be limited to, definition of the project and the public benefits, community and regulatory support, and support by the state economic development departments and the EPA regional office.

We are all aware that ideal brownfield projects are present in the Northwest, not just in the east coast or rust belt regions of country. The NEBC region should be able to capitalize on the available funding by identifying the projects now. NEBC will pass on grant and loan application criteria to its membership as soon as it is established by the EPA.

Another item of note from the act that is of interest to NEBC members is that the EPA is to adopt rules within two (2) years for Phase I Site Assessments. NEBC will keep track of this development to ensure that membership can comment on the draft rules as they are being developed.

COURSES IN HYDROGEOLOGY AND CHEMISTRY

PRINCIPLES OF HYDROGEOLOGY (GHYD-401) will be held May 8, 2002, 8:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. (1 Day) at the Mountaineers Conference Center, 300 Third Avenue W., Seattle, WA 98119. This course follows a natural sequence, beginning with a discussion of the hydrologic cycle followed by coverage of fundamental hydrogeologic concepts and equations. Participants will be lead through several example calculations that include methods for estimating unknown parameters. The course is intended to further the knowledge of hydrogeology and to improve competence and confidence in using empirical values in standard design formulae. The curriculum is designed for environmental professionals who are not hydrologists, but who require a basic knowledge of environmental hydrogeology in their work.

APPLIED ENVIRONMENTAL HYDROGEOLOGY (GHYD-402) will be held May 9 - 10, 2002, 8:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. (2 Days) at the Mountaineers Conference Center, 300 Third Avenue W., Seattle, WA 98119. This course continues a natural sequence with the preceding course Principles of Hydrogeology, May 8, 2002. The course begins with a more advanced discussion of groundwater flow and progresses through well design, solute transport, groundwater monitoring, and contaminant issues. Participants will be lead through several example calculations that include methods for estimating unknown parameters. The course is intended to further the knowledge of hydrogeology and its environmental applications. The curriculum is designed for environmental professionals who are not hydrologists, but who require a basic knowledge of environmental hydrogeology in their work.

FUNDAMENTAL CHEMISTRY FOR ENVIRONMENTAL PROFESSIONALS (CHEM-402) will be held May 14 - 15, 2002, 8:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. (2 Days) at the Tiffany Conference Center, 1410 SW Morrison, Portland, Oregon 97205. This course provides participants with a review of fundamental chemistry and environmental chemistry concepts. The curriculum is designed for environmental professionals who are not chemists, but who require an understanding of fundamental chemistry for their work. This introductory course is intended for environmental professionals seeking a review of fundamental chemistry as a foundation for understanding complex chemical reactions in the environment. It is recommended for environmental professionals including: environmental scientists, engineers, field technicians, regulators, and resource managers.

CHEMISTRY OF SOIL AND GROUND WATER (CHEM-403) will be held May 16 - 17, 2002, 8:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. (2 Days) at the Tiffany Conference Center, 1410 SW Morrison, Portland, Oregon 97205. This course provides participants with an introduction to the chemistry of soil and ground water and provides a foundation for understanding the chemical processes affecting the transport and fate of chemicals in soil and groundwater. This course is intended for environmental professionals who have completed the Fundamental Environmental Chemistry course (CHEM-402) and those with working knowledge of fundamental chemistry concepts.

FUNDAMENTALS OF SOIL AND GROUNDWATER CONTAMINATION (GHYD-403) will be held June 11 - 13, 2002 at 8:30 AM to 4:00 PM at the OXARC Training Center located at 4003 E. Broadway, Spokane, Washington. This course provides participants with an improved understanding of the fundamental processes governing transport and fate of contaminants in the subsurface. Participants will learn the chemical, hydrogeologic, and biological factors affecting the migration of contaminants in soil and groundwater and general methods for modeling these factors. The instructors will provide practical information on methods used to estimate and model necessary parameters for transport and fate investigations. This course will include hands on exercises that will help participants apply course concepts to real world scenarios.

ENVIRONMENTAL TECHNOLOGY VERIFICATION PROGRAM

Here are a few highlights of the EPA ETV Program for the past month. NEBC continues its work with ETV and we welcome updates from members on your interaction with the program. If you would like to explore the application of ETV technologies, please contact NEBC staff. We are especially interested in vendors seeking to submit a technology for verification or consultants applying a verified technology in the market. The ETV Program has verified more than 160 technologies to date. The latest is the following:

MICROFILTRATION USED IN PACKAGED DRINKING WATER TREATMENT SYSTEMS VERIFIED

The ETV Drinking Water System Center, operated by NSF International, has verified the performance of Pall Corporation's Microza Microfiltration (MF) System Module used in package drinking water treatment system applications. The performance of the MF unit was tested for the removal of cryptosporidium oocysts, E. coli, and bacillus spores. HADWACO MVR EVAPORATOR VERIFIED FOR WASTEWATER TREATMENT

The ETV Pollution Prevention Metal Finishing Pilot, operated by Concurrent Technologies Corporation (CTC), has verified the performance of Hadwaco US, Inc., Hadwaco MVR Evaporator Wastewater Treatment System. The system was tested, under actual production conditions, processing copper pickling wastewater. The system was evaluated for its ability to recycle wastewater and recover process chemistry. Electricity and water usage data were also collected to perform a brief cost analysis. The Verification Statement and Report will be posted to the ETV Web Site in the very near future. ION EXCHANGE RinSEWATER RECYCLING TECHNOLOGY VERIFIED

The ETV Pollution Prevention, Recycling, and Waste Treatment Pilot, operated by the California Environmental Protection Agency (Cal/EPA), has verified the performance of Hydromatix Corporation, Hydromatix 786E Ion Exchange System for rinsewater recycling. The 786E system was developed to remove cations and anions from rinse wastewaters generated during metal finishing operations such as electroplating, cleaning, and anodizing. ETV evaluated the system to determine the specific volumes of regenerant waste produced and the cation and anion exchange capacities restored during regeneration. The Statement and Report will be posted to the ETV Web Site in the very near future.

ARSENIC REDUCTION TECHNOLOGIES TO BE TESTED, VENDORS INVITED

The ETV Drinking Water Systems Center, operated by NSF International, is soliciting additional vendors for verification testing of arsenic reduction using sorptive media, ion exchange, and activated alumina technologies. MULTI-PARAMETER WATER PROBES TO BE TESTED

The ETV Advanced Monitoring Systems Center, operated by Battelle, is conducting verification testing beginning in late April 2002 in the Charleston, SC, area. The verification test will include some or all of the following parameters: temperature, pH, nitrate, phosphate, turbidity, conductivity, chlorophyll, and dissolved oxygen. The AMS Center is collaborating on the test with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Center for Coastal Environmental Health and Biomolecular Research (CCEHBR) in Charleston, which offers freshwater, salt water, and a controlled site for testing. DECENTRALIZED (ON-SITE) WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEMS FOR RESIDENTIAL NUTRIENT REDUCTION, OTHER TESTING UNDERWAY

Four vendors are participating in the ETV Source Water Protection Technology Pilot's verification testing with residential nutrient reduction technologies at the field test location on Cape Cod, MA. Three of these vendors: F.R. Mahony & Associates, Waterloo Systems, Inc., and AWT Environmental completed their test cycle in March 2002. The third vendor, Septitech, Inc., started testing late last year and will complete the required 12-month schedule later this year. A fifth vendor, Bio-Microbics, Inc., has a technology installed at an alternate test facility located in Vancouver, B.C., and is currently in the early months of testing.
