## - GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS -

### DEQ ONSITE PROGRAM IMPROVEMENT UPDATE

The Onsite Sewage Program Advisory Committee met Friday, April 18 to complete final recommendations for changes to the statewide program - for areas covered by DEQ as well as counties.

The most difficult issue from the previous meeting was over operations and maintenance requirements for non-standards onsite sewage systems such as sand filters and advanced treatment units. There was some review and discussion of the existing rules requiring maintenance for sand filters. After some lively discussion, it was agreed to recommend mandatory O&M requirements for advanced treatment units and sand filters installed or repaired in the future. Existing sand filters and all pressure distribution systems would not have new criteria imposed. Also, the DEQ should use the existing review and approval process to educate all owners on the maintenance needs of their systems and the significant costs to expect in the future if maintenance is ignored.

The maintenance requirements would likely include mandatory maintenance contracts with certified service providers, an annual fee and report on maintenance, and an authorization for the Agency (counties or DEQ) to conduct an inspection and charge a higher fee if annual reports are not submitted. The committee decided against recommending some type of deed notice or restriction.

The committee submitted the final recommendations to the DEQ Onsite Program, who will proceed with writing rule language. The draft rules will be available by June 1, and reviewed at a committee meeting on June 6, 2003. ## GOVERNOR SIGNS NEBC BILL

On April 17, Governor Gary Locke signed into law H.B. 1526, an act relating to cost-reimbursement agreements between state agencies and permit applicants. This measure was a priority for NEBC; it passed the House of Representatives 94-0, and passed the Senate with a vote of 49-0. The measure extends the deadline for entering into cost-reimbursement agreements from July 1, 2005 to July 1, 2007. With the passage of this measure, we will be able to clearly demonstrate the benefits of this approach to permitting. The Washington Department of Ecology has been using this process to reduce permit backlogs. In addition, with the current budget deficit, cost-reimbursement will provide a tool to assure quality permit processing that includes the environmental industry sector. Under a cost-reimbursement agreement, the applicant pays the reasonable cost incurred by the agency for permit coordination, environmental review, application review, technical studies, permit processing, and carrying out the requirements of other relevant laws. Funds under a cost-reimbursement agreement are used by the agency to contract with independent consultants to carry out the work covered by the agreement. Representative Kelli Linville, D-Bellingham, was the prime sponsor of H.B. 1526. NEBC has benefited from her strong support of this concept, and commitment to expanding contracting opportunities.

This course is recommended for all environmental professionals working with contaminated soil and water with minimal formal training in this subject. It is also recommended for project managers seeking a review of the subject.

**Applied Electrofishing Principles and Practices - Effective Methods to Maximize Fish Survival Rates (BIO-407B)** will be held May 27 - 28, 2003 (1.5 Days) at Mountaineers Conference Center, Pinnacle Room located at 300 Third Avenue West, Seattle, Washington 98119. Electrofishing is an effective way to sample freshwater fishes. However,

electrofishing may cause fish injury or mortality. The proper balance between efficient sampling and minimal adverse effects to fish is achieved through understanding the principles of electricity and use of proper field techniques. This course will provide a one-day overview of electrofishing principles and practices and one-half day of field experience. On May 27, participants will spend the day in the classroom learning electrofishing principles and science. On May 28, participants will spend one-half day (8:30 A.M. to 12 P.M.) in the field learning backpack electrofisher techniques at a nearby stream.

**ARCVIEW 8 and Environmental Applications of GIS Workshop Course ID: GIS-403** will be held June 17 - 19, 2003, 8:30 A.M. to 4 P.M. (3 Days) at Portland State University, 1721 SW Broadway, Portland, Oregon. This 3-day hands on class will introduce participants to the environmental applications of ESRI's ArcView 8.2 software. Beginning with a discussion of general concepts and vocabulary, the course will move into teaching basic ArcView functionality. Each participant will have their own computer workstation to create, edit, display and analyze real world environmental data during numerous hands on exercises. On the third day, participants will be given an opportunity to become more proficient with their skills by applying their knowledge to more complex and in depth projects.
