OLD AND NEW ISSUES KEEP NEBC BUSY IN LEGISLATURE

TAX ISSUES The 2004 Legislative Session in Washington convened on January 12, and is off to a fast pace. Of the nearly 3,000 bills introduced last year, all that were not passed are still "alive" in this second year of the biennium. Additionally, over 1,700 new bills have been introduced this January. Bills still require the same level of review and number of procedural steps, but must complete this process in sixty days. This leads to intense turnaround times on bills for public hearing and review, floor activity and movement through both chambers. NEBC's legislative agenda includes tax incentives, protecting our recent gains in permit streamlining processes, and other environmental policy issues.

NEBC continues to work for the extension of tax incentives for Research and Development in High Technology industries, including environmental technology. Without extension, these important tax benefits will soon expire. Many Washington environmental companies have used the tax credits for contracted or in-house R&D, saving thousands to hundreds of thousands of dollars. Very similar bills have passed the House and Senate, and the differences must now be resolved between the two chambers. We are optimistic regarding the passage of this important measure; however, there are many groups that established a priority to undo the tax incentives in the hopes of generating additional funding for their issues of concern. Even though these measures are moving through the legislative process, they will be a target for groups that want past programs restored, increased salaries for state workers, and other programs.

NEBC has also worked hard to restore the tax incentives for environmental remediation. These tax incentives expired last year, and NEBC has continued to work through the interim to focus attention on the need to reauthorize this program. To date, NEBC and the Washington Ports have been the only groups that have promoted this environmental incentive in the Legislature. Our industry partners have not stepped up to provide significant support, despite the substantial savings they could achieve on remediation projects. With continuing pressures on the budget, the prospects for renewing these tax incentives are slim at this time.

ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY OR UNFAIR COMPETITION? Legislation has been introduced on behalf of port districts to allow them to receive compensation for consulting services related to port and airport-related issues. Their stated intent is the need to receive compensation when foreign ports or other organizations request their advice on port operational issues. NEBC has expressed strong concerns that the legislation is too open-ended, and could lead to significant and unfair competition with private sector consulting businesses. Although the proponents have assured us that they do not intend to allow for consulting that would compete with the private sector, their testimony described potential consulting activities that could create conflicts. A wide open statutory authority could lead to potential abuse by some port districts looking for additional revenues.

NEBC is attempting to negotiate with the Chair, Sponsors of the legislation and the ports to assure that unfair competition is not authorized under state law. In addition, we will be seeking an opportunity to work with the ports to establish an approach that protects NEBC members. If this effort is successful, it could lead to new opportunities to leverage the ports' contacts and relationships with other ports and governments, and create new contracting opportunities for local businesses.

NEBC is offering an opportunity for members to learn more about the legislative process in Olympia, with its third annual "Environmental Industry Day on the Hill." NEBC lobbyists Jerry Smedes and Linda Dennis will meet with interested members on February 24 in Olympia to explain the legislative process, meet with selected legislators, and visit the Capitol campus during the Legislative Session. FINAL MEETING OF LABORATORY REVIEW WORKGROUP AND SUMMARY RECOMMENDATIONS REPORT

The final meeting of the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) Laboratory Review Workgroup was held on December 18, 2003. NEBC is one of the representative stakeholders on the Workgroup. The first half of the meeting included comments and revisions on the draft summary recommendations report. The second half of the meeting included a presentation of the recommendations to Stephanie Hallock, Director of the DEQ, Paul Slyman, Deputy Director of the DEQ, and Lauri Aunan, Legislative/Budget Manager for the DEQ.

A draft of the summary report was forwarded to the workgroup for final comments on January 15, 2004, and the final report was distributed on February 2, 2004. To review the final report, an electronic link will be added shortly to the NEBC website.

The Department of Administrative Services (DAS) has reported that an official offer has been made on a building for the new DEQ/Public Health Lab facilities. DAS was informed of the workgroup's decision that "minimally adequate" was the appropriate consideration for the building size. An electronic link to the DAS fact sheet will also be added to the NEBC website.

Although the workgroup's task has been completed, NEBC will continue to monitor the implementation of the report's recommendations and the building acquisition. A brief overview of the report and the workgroup's findings will be presented at the NEBC Cascade Chapter luncheon on February 12, 2004.

POWER PROBE UPDATE

DEQ POWER PROBE SAFETY UPGRADE The DEQ Power Probe, in operation since 1998, is being upgraded with a new a vehicle for safety reasons. The Probe is currently mounted on a Ford Model F350 super-duty truck chassis. Art's Manufacturing & Supply of American Falls, Idaho (AMS), manufacturer of the Probe, now constructs similar probe units with a larger truck chassis and payload capacity; recent experiences with a broken wheel hub during normal highway driving on the F350 have prompted DEQ to make the upgrade for safety reasons. The Probe was originally paid for by a grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). EPA has recently agreed to pay for the Probe chassis vehicle upgrade.

POWER PROBE USE IN 2003 In 2003 the Power Probe was used primarily in support of two EPA grants to DEQ: a *State Response Grant*, which includes funding to perform Targeted Brownfield Assessments; and a separate *Rural Brownfield Assessment Grant*. Under these two programs, the probe was mobilized and used at nine sites across the state in 2003.

POWER PROBE USE IN 2004 The Power Probe will continue to support the two brownfield grant programs in 2004 and federally-funded site assessments under the State Response grant. The Probe is a key component in the administration of the grants and provides DEQ with the opportunity to obtain valuable data from many more sites than could be accomplished without it, especially in rural or remote areas of the state. This use enables DEQ to effectively stretch limited federal funding dollars and conduct work in areas of the state that normally might not be investigated. The probe is scheduled to be involved in 11 of the 120 to 150 assessments planned by DEQ's Cleanup Program in 2004.

DEQ POWER PROBE AN EFFECTIVE INVESTIGATION TOOL Although used only on a limited number of sites each year, the DEQ Power Probe has become an effective tool for conducting Site Assessment activity on brownfield sites. With ease of mobilization, cost-effectiveness, and continued support by EPA to use the Probe on federally funded assessments, the DEQ Power Probe remains an important tool for the Cleanup Program.

MERCURY REMOVAL FROM WASTE STREAMS USING A NOVEL SYNTHETIC NANOPOROUS SORBENT

ABSTRACT

A nanostructured sorbent material developed by scientists at Pacific Northwest National Laboratory has proven to be an effective and voracious tool for "absorbing" mercury from low-volume waste streams in a variety of real-life situations. Thiol-SAMMS is a simple, inexpensive and easy-to-use technology that absorbs mercury in liquids and can be easily disposed of afterwards. These novel materials consist of functional molecules capable of selectively binding mercury covalently bound, as densely populated monolayers, to the synthetic nanoporous substrates.

Mercury adsorption data indicated that this sorbent (Self-Assembled Monolayers on Mesoporous Silica - SAMMS) can achieve Hg loading as high as ~635 mg/g. The high affinity for Hg adsorption by this material was reflected by K_d values as high as 3.5 x 10⁸ ml/g. Test data indicated that mercury adsorption performance of SAMMS was not significantly affected by the presence of other cations (Ca, Cd, Cu, Fe, Ni, Pb, and Zn) and complexing anions (Cl, CN, CO₃, SO₄, and PO₄) in waste solution. Adsorption kinetics studies indicated that SAMMS adsorbed mercury very rapidly (about 99.9% adsorption occurring within first five minutes). Tests conducted using samples of different aqueous and non-aqueous waste streams have confirmed the exemplary performance characteristics of SAMMS sorbents.

Thiol-SAMMS in powder form is currently available for use on low-volume waste streams. A PNNL team is also working on industrial applications for the technology.
